## Supporting New Catholic School Leaders

When Colleen Carroll stepped into her role as principal of St. Jude Catholic School in New Lenox, she wasn't alone. Through the Emmaus Mentor Program, supported by your gifts to the Catholic Ministries Annual Appeal, she was paired with veteran principal Carol Albreski of St. Andrew the Apostle in Romeoville.

"The Emmaus Mentor Program has helped to make me more confident in my decision making, and that's had a ripple effect on my teachers and my students as I lead the school," shares Colleen.

The program, developed by the Catholic Schools Office, pairs experienced principals with newcomers, creating a support system that extends far beyond the principal's office. "It gives the mentees a person to reach out to, someone they can contact when they have questions," explains Carol, who has mentored principals for two years. Through monthly meetings, school visits, and ongoing mentorship, new leaders gain the confidence and quidance they need to succeed.

The impact reaches students like eighth-grader Josh at St. Jude. "I like St. Jude because we learn about Jesus, our faith, and to follow Him," Josh says. "We have religion every day and go to Mass on Thursdays, so we learn more about Him and grow stronger in our faith."





## Our Catholic Youth — On Fire with Faith!

Last summer the Joliet Diocese hosted a youth conference that called nearly 2,000 teens together in worship, adoration, and spirited activities that enriched their faith and planted seeds for their commitment to the future of the Catholic Church!

Young lives were changed profoundly alongside dynamic clergy and inspirational speakers. Xander, a high school junior in attendance, felt "On fire with his faith!" "I used to look at my faith as something I did, like homework. I realize now, it's much more, it requires ALL of me."

Before Bishop Hicks gave his final blessing at the closing Mass, the spirit moved a group of teens to come forward who weren't Catholics to ask about becoming baptized. More than 50 young women shared their interest in becoming a sister or nun. And, over 100 young men said they were open to the possibility of becoming a priest!

"It was a beautiful witness to the hunger our youth have for God—and the future of our Church!" said Bishop Hicks. He acknowledged that the event would not have been possible without the generous support of the CMAA donors. "You made this happen!"



### From Pre-Med to Priesthood, One Seminarian's Journey

Joshua Solarz was captain of his high school varsity soccer and tennis teams, crowned homecoming king, and graduated class valedictorian. Yet, he felt empty inside. He was raised Catholic but had fallen away. "I knew something, or someone, was missing," he said.

While studying pre-med, at the University of Notre Dame, he connected with a group of students who were "fully alive!" "We had a lot in common, but these guys had something more," Joshua shared. That something was a personal relationship with Christ.

Encouraged by his new friends, he started attending daily Mass and revisited the Sacrament of Reconciliation. While leaving the confessional, "Jesus invited me to make him the center of my life." Joshua felt Jesus' words. "You've tried everything to be happy, why not give me a try?"

After graduation, while working as a medical scribe, he was struck by how most patients talked about their emotional sadness versus their physical pain. He felt the Holy Spirit nudge his heart, saying: "Remember, Josh? This was you! What they're missing is faith."

He went on to join a young adult group where a wise diocesan priest offered him direction. There are three types of doctors: Doctors of the body. Doctors of the mind. And Doctors of the soul — Catholic priests.

"I finally knew what I was being called to do!" said Joshua. He is now in his third year at Mundelein Seminary and will be ordained a priest in 2027.

The trauma of homelessness takes a toll on mental health.

Thanks in large part to CMAA donors, the counseling services of Catholic Charities has broadened their client base to include Daybreak Center, an emergency shelter in Joliet. Working with individuals and families, their mission is strong: to help navigate the healing journey.

Building community aids in the healing process. Group therapy is one way to do this. As is the program's open-door policy that invites clients to continue therapy after they've secured housing outside the facility. "We want them to know they are an important part of our community and welcome back as needed," shared Division Director, Dr. Corinna House.

Dr. House recognizes the benefits of counseling and its positive impact on stable housing. "We realize that in order for our clients to secure and sustain housing, we need to address mental health."

Jane O'Connell, a licensed therapist at Daybreak, finds tremendous joy in walking with her clients on their journey to wellness. "They're human beings— just like me." She is truly grateful for the CMAA donors.
