Time was also dedicated to worship and prayer. Together, the missionaries shared an epiphany: travelling far from home brought them even closer to God. A profound example of this occurred during silent reflection when one missionary received his calling from God. He is currently in the seminary discerning priesthood. Mission accomplished in many unexpected, miraculous ways!





Going Beyond the Classroom

Becoming a Catholic priest is an intensive process. Together with a dedicated team of priests, religious men and women, and professors, seminarians spend years building the foundation that's needed to live a life dedicated to serving God and His people.

An important part of the process are the summer assignments that target specific areas of formation.

No One Chooses Homelessness

There are many reasons why people find themselves on the street. "No one decides on Monday they are going to a homeless shelter on Friday," said Barb Sullivan-Thurlby, Division Director of Community Services at Daybreak Center in Joliet. "Challenges and trauma have lead them here."

The facility provides emergency housing and supportive services to individuals and families in crisis. With 93 beds, it's always full and there's always a wait list.

The goal of Daybreak is to guide clients back to independent living. Working one-on-one with an individualized plan is vital. Equally important is serving with compassion.

Because as Barb shared, "Being homeless doesn't mean you don't have feelings."

Kortlan considers himself a living witness that the program works. The stigma of 'homelessness' hurts.

"There are good people in here, and as long as you work hard on your end, you'll have a happy ending. I promise, if you donate, it will help lives!"
